Here are some of the ways you can contribute:

- Articles: 800 to 2,500 words. They can be educational, informative, etc.
- Reviews: 600 to 1,000 words. Could be reviews about books, conferences, you name it.
- Letters: 300 words. You can write to us with opinions, statements, announcements, or questions (we will do our best to reply!)

Submissions should follow these **guidelines**:

- All submissions must be written in English.
- Send your submission via email to caduceusnewsletter@ata-md.org as a Word document.
- Include author's name, email address, a short bio (50 to 80 words), and a headshot (optional).
- Avoid long blocks of text. Break down the main points of the article into sections with subheads.
- Do not attempt to cover everything about a particular topic in one article. Narrow the focus of discussion to a few main areas.
- Text must not be "advertorial," promotional, or "marketing" in nature. Avoid self-promotion and make sure the text is not biased toward your products and services. With this in mind, you can demonstrate how the product can be used and highlight your level of expertise using specific examples that are easy to follow.
- Each submission is evaluated for content by our Editorial Committee.
- Our copy editors polish your article for flow and consistency.
- All articles are subject to editing for grammar, style, and space limitations.
